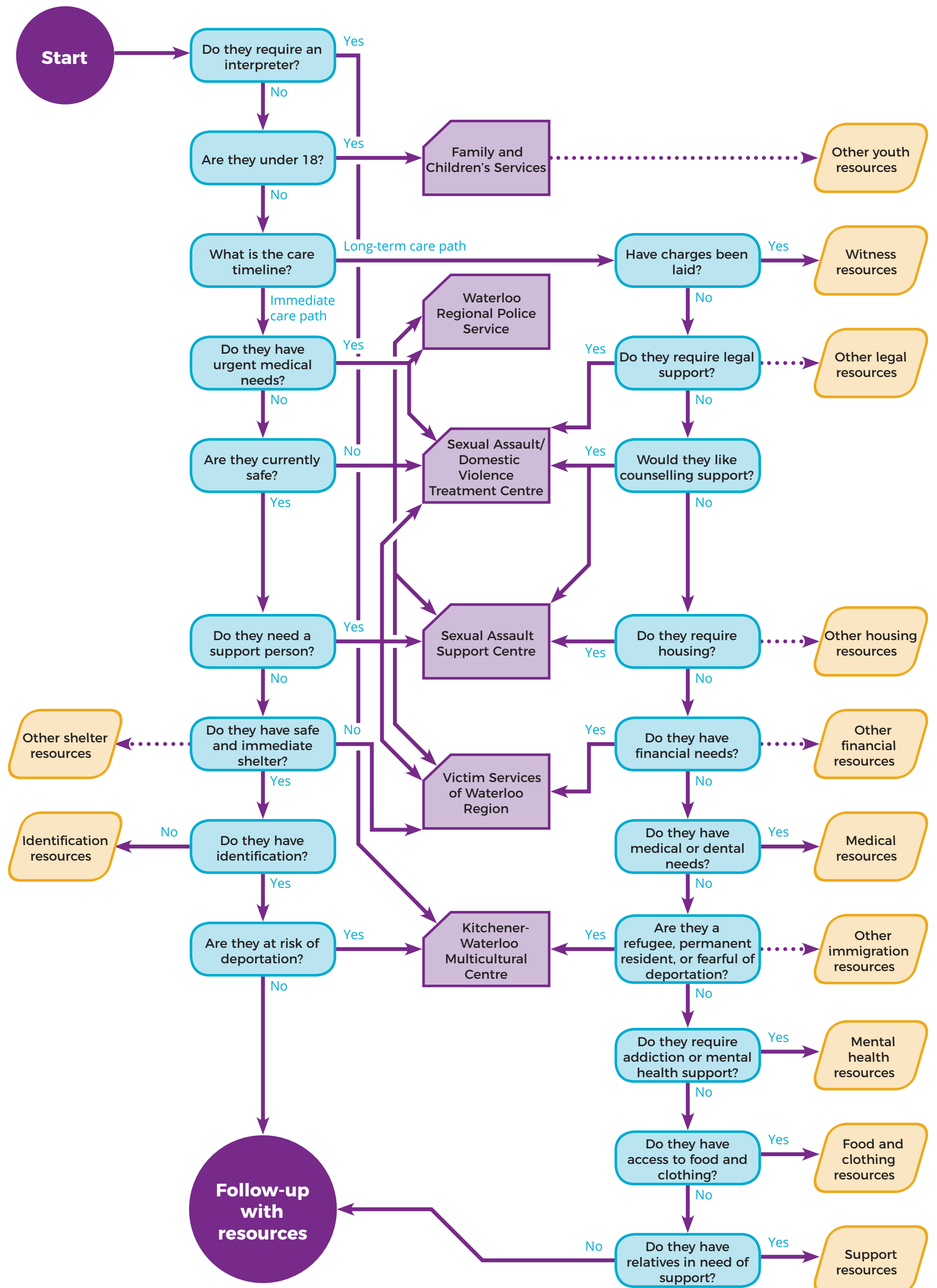

Population served

Family & Children's Services of the Waterloo Region (FACS) is legally known as The Children's Aid Society of the Regional Municipality of Waterloo. It is our role to respond and work together with families, their supports and our communities to protect and care for children who have been abused or neglected, or who are at risk of being abused or neglected.

Assisting families and children to heal from trauma, learn new skills and grow into their potential is often not covered by government funding. The Family & Children's Services Foundation relies on the generosity of individuals, families, businesses and other foundations to help local children and families in need to heal, learn and grow.

Accessibility

We are committed to making sure that we meet the standards of accessibility for people with disabilities who use our facilities and services. Our services follow the ideals of dignity, independence, integration and equal opportunity. We will meet or exceed all applicable legislation regarding the provision of customer service.

We have provided AODA training to our staff, volunteers, foster parents, contractors and any other people who interact with the public on our behalf.

Accountability

Ontario's 46 Children's Aid Societies (CAS) are independent and board-operated agencies that carry out their work within their local communities, and are responsible for providing child protection services in accordance with the Child and Family Services Act. The government funds 100% of Children's Aid Societies' approved budgets with respect to child welfare service.

Commitments

We envision Waterloo Region as a caring community where children and their families thrive. In order to move closer to this ideal, we are committed to building relationships with families and communities for the well-being and safety of children and youth.

At the earliest stage possible, we plan together with families, their supports and our community partners to help parents care safety for their children. Every family has a voice when planning for their children.

When help is needed over a longer period of time; assessment, planning and supports are provided to the family by child welfare professionals who have a blend of expertise and resources that best fits the child, youth and family's situation.

Services specific to human trafficking

We will, within the mandate of our service:

- Respond to any report concerning a child/youth up to age 17 who was sexually exploited as a result of

- Offer non-emergency counselling services through our Sexual Abuse Treatment Program
- Provide emotional support, information and referrals to survivors of sexual exploitation to our AHTC partners
- Provide safety planning and support to adult clients and youth in care of FACS Waterloo who have experienced sexual violence within the context of commercial sexual exploitation
- Provide adult clients and youth in care of FACS Waterloo, advocacy and accompaniments to the police station, court house, hospital or other related appointments;
- Provide assistance with Criminal Injuries Compensation Board applications and Victim Impact Statements;
- Provide basic practical assistance (transportation to counselling appointments, etc.)

Description of services

We will, within the mandate of our service and funding:

- Provide language interpreter services for all victims/survivors of Human Trafficking in Waterloo Region, Guelph-Wellington, Brantford and surrounding townships at no charge to the service providers or clients.
- Provide language interpreters to help service providers and victims/survivors who do not speak English to communicate with one another in emergency and nonemergency situations.
- Ensure we have permission from the victim/ survivor to provide language interpretation services for them.
- Ensure our language interpreters follow the Standard of Practice and Code of Ethics for Interpreters which includes accuracy and fidelity, confidentiality, impartiality, maintenance of role boundaries, accountability and professionalism.

Settlement workers are available to provide all newcomers and immigrants, regardless of status, confidential services including needs assessment, information and referral, orientation, assistance in completing forms, translations, employment related, services and supports, workshops and information sessions.

Accountability

The Manager of the Centre is responsible for ensuring that proper procedures are carried out. Complaints or concerns can be addressed to the Manager of the Centre. The Centre is a program administered by St. Mary's General Hospital in Kitchener. All social workers are members of the Ontario College of Social Workers and Social Service Workers. All nurses are members of the College of Nurses of Ontario.

Commitments

We will within the mandate of our service:

- Recognise the importance of providing client directed service and promoting choice, respect and empowerment
- Treat all individuals with dignity and compassion
- Accept the individual's perception of the assault
- Involve family and/or support systems where consent is given by the individual

Services:

- Acute and follow up care and counselling to women, children and men who are victims/survivors of recent sexual assault or domestic violence
- Medical examination, forensic evidence collection, STI, HIV and pregnancy treatment, DFSA screening, crisis intervention and referral to community resources
- Nonurgent assessment and care to prepubertal children in paediatric clinic
- Short term counselling, referral and consultation, public education, research, advocacy and community development

Procedures

1. On call nurse and social worker team are paged with consent of the individual, by the emergency room staff
2. Team arrives within 45 minutes of page
3. Assess needs for translation, injuries and accessibility
4. Transfer to SA/DVTC suite in the hospital
5. Obtain relevant information
6. Explain confidentiality, and options for care: examination, STI and HIV treatment, DFSA screening, pregnancy prevention, collection of forensic evidence, crisis and follow up counselling, referrals, risk assessment and safety planning, option of police involvement
7. If victim is a child, explain "Duty to Report" to Family and Children's Services
8. Provide follow up plans and resources as needed (i.e. HIV Pep x 28 days, follow-up counselling, community resources, shelter, etc.)
9. Provide written information about services provided, plans and resources available.

VICTIM SERVICES OF WATERLOO REGION

Victim Services of Waterloo Region (VSWR) provides immediate support services and referrals to victims of crime and sudden tragedies, 24 hours a day 7 days a week. VSWR is equipped to support survivors of human trafficking and their families at three stages: those who are at risk of trafficking; those currently being trafficked; and those who have previously been trafficked. VSWR offers high risk programming across Waterloo Region through the Victim Quick Response Program. The Victims and Vulnerable Persons Division (VVPD) of the Ministry of the Attorney General (MAG) funds the Victim Quick Response Program (VQRP or the Program) to support victims of violent crimes by providing financial assistance with essential expenses in order to lessen the impact of the crime, enhance safety, and meet practical needs. VQRP is a program of last resort and is only available when there is no other publicly funded service available that can meet the



individual's needs, and the individual is in need of financial support.

Financial assistance for HT victims is available to help cover:

- Practical assistance expenses;
- Personal expenses;
- Safety expenses;
- Travel expenses;
- Expenses for restoration of crime scene;
- Counselling expenses;
- Residential treatment expenses.

Financial assistance for witnesses and immediate family members of HT victims is available to help cover:

- Practical assistance expenses;
- Safety expenses;
- Travel and related expenses;
- Counselling and related transportation expenses.

YOUTH RESOURCES

Child Witness Centre

The Child Witness Centre provides caring and compassionate support and advocacy for children and youth (under 18 years of age) who are victims or witnesses of crime and their families. Our goal is to reduce the risk of children and youth being re-victimized through the process by ensuring they are informed, supported and included. We do this through our 2 primary programs:

- The Child and Youth Advocate Program in the Child and Youth Advocacy Centre, and
- The Child Witness Program.

Child and Youth Advocacy Centre

The Child and Youth Advocacy Centre (CYAC) is a child and youth friendly, trauma informed approach to investigating child abuse and ensuring the victims and witnesses are supported and connected to services in the community to help them begin to heal. The core partners in the CYAC are the Child Witness Centre, Family and Children's Services and the Waterloo Regional Police Service. A Child and Youth Advocate from the Child Witness Centre provides support, advocacy and information during the interviews and following the interview(s) provides assistance with making referrals and connecting to community resources, specific to the needs to the individual.

In relation to services specific to Human Trafficking, for investigations at the CYAC an advocate will provide support and if charges are laid, caseworkers through the Child Witness Program can provide support to children and youth (under 18 years of age) who are witnesses.
